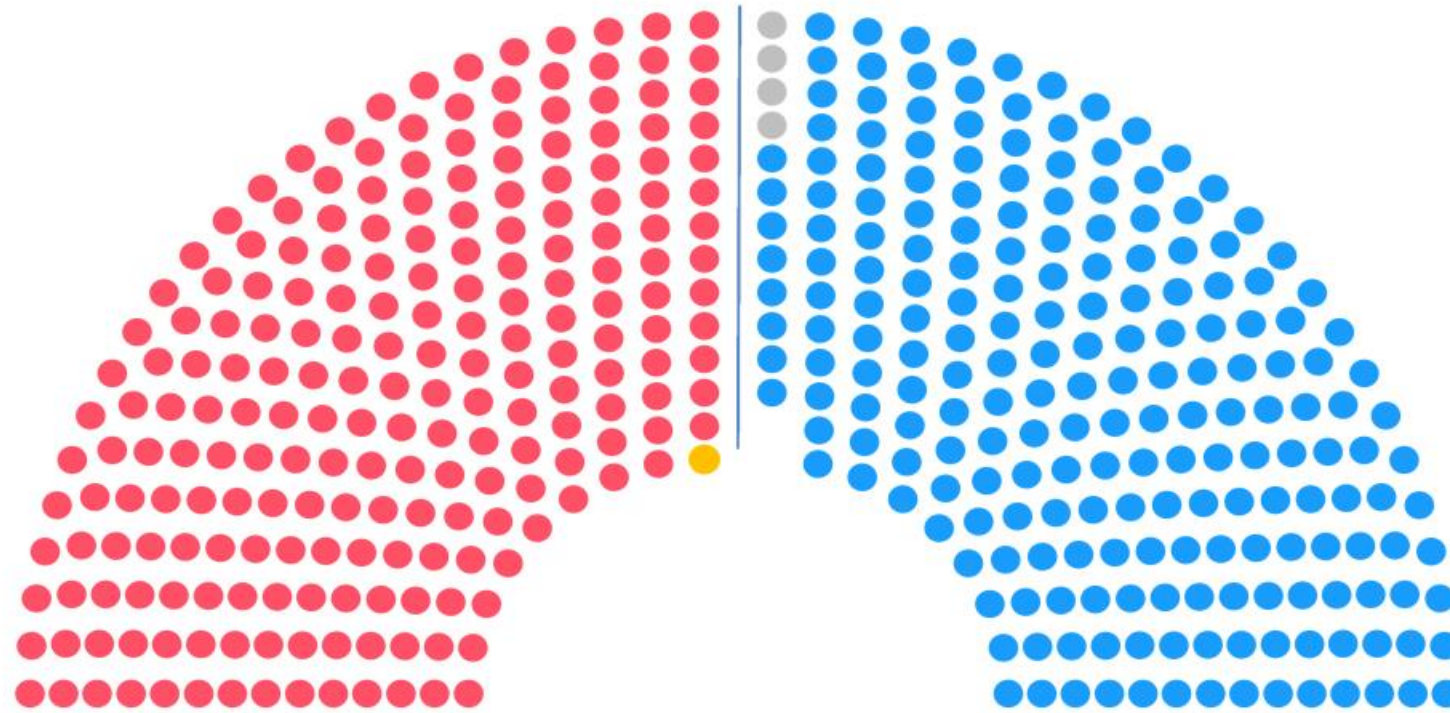

Redistricting 2025-26

- Mid-decade redistricting – not unheard of, but this is a notable amount, with 10 states creating new maps.
- Even more state parties attempted and rejected new maps.
- *Louisiana v. Callais* – requires LA to draw new maps. Also results in new maps in AL and TN.

Redistricting: Future Outlook

More changes this cycle?

- Unlikely a state this late would propose and approve a new map
- Any changes would be more likely to happen from a challenge
 - Florida map in particular faces the strongest legal challenges
- Mid-decade redistricting beyond 2026?
 - Certainly possible....

2026 Midterms: Change is coming

At least **14%** of Congress will not be returning

12 Senators
65 Representatives

2026 Midterms: Political Outlook

House

- General consensus still favors Democrats
 - Midterms are always a challenge for the party in power
 - 218 needed for a majority, 213 seats are rated as leaning R, 207 seats lean D, 15 are toss ups.

Senate

- Republicans are favored, but don't rule out Democrats
 - Democrats need to flip 4 seats, target states include Maine, North Carolina, Alaska, Ohio, Iowa and Texas
 - Democrats will also have to keep vulnerable seats like Georgia, Michigan and New Hampshire.

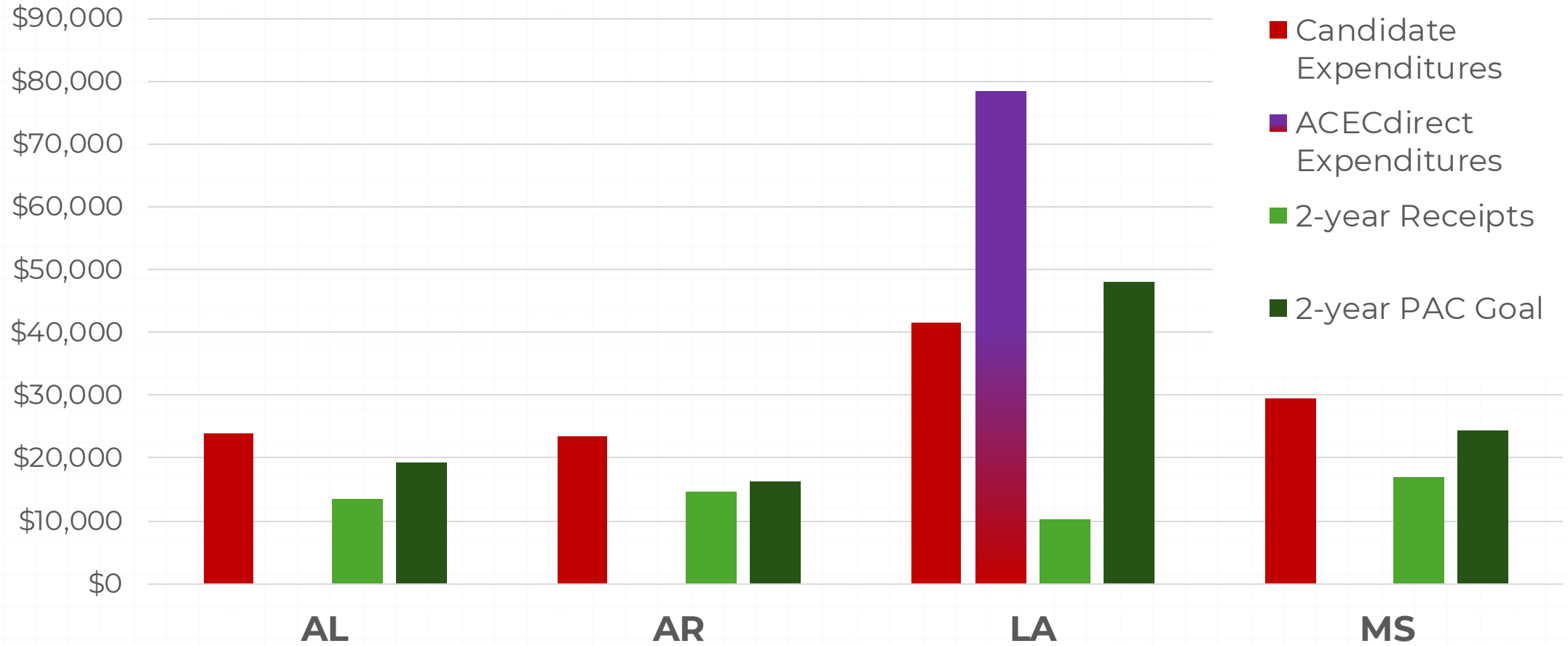
Direct Giving

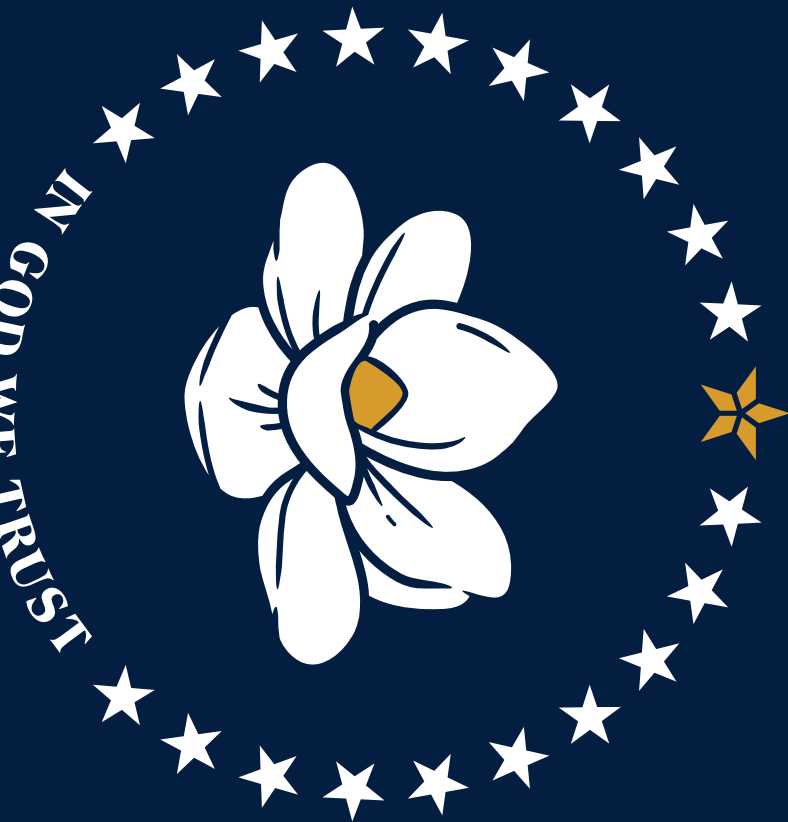
